## DEVOTIONAL GUIDE

### MONDAY

Read Psalm 119:97-105

Consult your notes from the sermon or recall the 3 assumptions Jeremy described. Assess how well you are able to claim these convictions. Confess where you are struggling.

The passion described in Psalm 119 can only be created by God with your willingness. Ask God to create in you a thirst for His Word.

Pick one phrase or verse from Psalm 119:97-105 that you can ponder throughout the day. Write it down and post it someplace. Find an object to symbolize this verse or phrase and put it where you'll see it often. Repeat it frequently in your mind. Pray it into your will; your conviction; your actions.

Possible symbols: lamp, open Bible, a jar of honey

### TUESDAY

Read 2 Timothy 3:16-17

Consider how you know what the verses say is true. What experiences have taught you so? Who have you trusted that has instilled this conviction in you? In what ways does our Reformed tradition help you?

### WEDNESDAY

Read Psalm 1:1-3

Keep asking God to create this attitude toward scripture in you.

Continue pondering the phrase you chose on Monday. Add to it something from these verses in Psalm 1.

Possible symbols: a plant that is thriving or a plant that is dying, a piece of fruit, a glass of water, something you find delightful or makes you happy. Let this symbol remind you to cultivate a longing for God's Word

### THURSDAY

Read Matthew 5:17-20

Read and reflect on this statement from the Westminster Confession:

"The authority of the Holy Scripture, for which it ought to be believed and obeyed, dependeth not upon the testimony of any man or church, but wholly upon God (who is truth itself), the author thereof; and therefore it is to be received, because it is the Word of God."

### FRIDAY

Read all of Psalm 119

Underline or list all the positive adjectives used to describe God's Word.

Summarize the negative consequences of not being guided by God's Word. Put it in a way that has meaning to you and not just the author of the Psalm.
